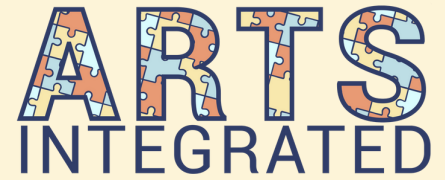


Storyboarding



OVERVIEW

Storyboards are universal, simple tools that help artists visually map out and tell a story. There are many applications for using storyboards in the classroom, including activities like: Summary, Tell a Story, Make a Plan, and Reflection.

DIRECTONS

- ▶ Print the storyboard [template](#) for students.
- ▶ Create specific directions, prompts, or questions for students.
- ▶ Show the instructional video on artsintegrated.org/storyboarding.
- ▶ Pass out the templates and let students get to work.

Note: Storyboards can be Black & White or in Color, and using text is optional

POSSIBLE ACTIVITIES

SUMMARY

Summarize a book, chapter, historical event, scientific experiment, field trip, movie, or lesson.

TELL A STORY

Develop and explain an original idea.

MAKE A PLAN

List out and draw the steps to complete a plan of action or goals.

REFLECTION

Reflect on an experience, field trip, unit, lesson, semester, or project.

Use guiding questions for different boards: What is one thing you learned? What was your most challenging obstacle? What is one area you can improve upon moving forward?

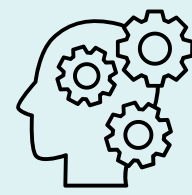
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
